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8	<u>Alarmed</u> that there are currently 50 million people who are victims of human trafficking
9	and that over 27.6 million of them are in forced labour,
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11	<b>Deeply concerned</b> that 12% of those in forced labour are children and more than half
12	of them are involved in commercial and sexual exploitation and the devastating effects
13	which deprive them of an education,
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15	Aware that 67% of people trafficked for sexual reasons are women,
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17	Reminding all member states of the UN Protocol to Prevent, Supress and Punish
18	Trafficking in Persons, especially Women and Children,
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20	Reaffirming the job of the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC),
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22	<b>Encourage</b> all member states to collaborate together in order to achieve the aims of
23	this resolution as a means of tackling the issue of human trafficking,
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25	Aware of the detrimental psychological effect which human trafficking can have on all
26	victims,
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29	1. Requests the creation of a sub-body in the UNODC called the Recovered
30	Education for Children (REFC) which is specifically aimed in reducing education
31	lost due to human trafficking involving children and asks for funding for the
32	following:
33	a. Programs for missed education at different stages as children affected
34	will range in ages which will be monitored by the UN to ensure sufficient
35	education is being provided,
36	b. Advertising through ways such as but not limited to social media to
37	attract more people to get involved in helping educating child victims of
38	human trafficking,
39 10	c. Providing programs which specialise in teaching child victims of human
10 11	trafficking basic literacy skills which are beneficial for their futures;
11 12	2. Suggest increased levels of accurity at accustry barders and notantial burners
12 12	Suggest increased levels of security at country borders and potential human  trefficient between the country borders.
13	trafficking hotspots:

a. Implement more CCTV cameras in accordance with countries' 44 45 governments, 46 b. Increase the amount of physical security guards whose records have 47 been checked by the UNODC to avoid misbehaviour; 48 49 3. Ask for funding from the UN to increase awareness on the topic of human 50 trafficking by: 51 a. Implementing educational programs which inform adults and those not in 52 school on the dangers of human trafficking and how to spot it, 53 b. Increasing education in schools and provide this information online to 54 ensure the maximum amount of people are able to be informed on the 55 issue of human trafficking, 56 c. Use this increased education as a way to also protect any children from 57 experiencing human trafficking in the future, d. Provide education to inform people on how to quickly respond to any 58 59 forms of child sexual trafficking to ensure that the minimum harm is done 60 and to also increase chances of catching individuals or organizations 61 responsible to reduce cases in the future; 62 63 64 65

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- 4. Urges the UNODC to provide funds for support programs consisting of volunteers hired by the UN for those affected to ensure they can receive any help, such as therapy:
  - a. These support programs will be frequently monitored by the UNODC to ensure they are constantly to a high standard and effective,
  - b. This support will also be available online as well to allow as many people as possible to receive any necessary help;
- 5. Calls for more frequent inspections by the UNODC of three times a year or more on organizations to ensure they are not responsible for or involved in human trafficking and that these inspections are at random times to properly verify this;
- 6. Invites all members to attend a triannual conference, to monitor the progress of clauses of this resolution on reducing human trafficking and to continue to collaborate and ensure funding is consistent and to a sufficient amount to ensure the maximum quality of help is being provided to those who are suffering around the world as a result of human trafficking.
